Trustees Corner

How well do you know the rules and regulations that Group Executive Committees need to be aware of. Can you answer the questions below?

Q. “When can a Chairman use their casting vote?”

A. See “POR Chapter 3 The Scout Group, 3.23 Constitution of the Scout Group

d. Conduct of meetings

ii. Decisions are made by a majority of votes cast by those present at the meeting. In the event of an equal number of votes being cast on either side the chair does not have a casting vote and the matter is taken not to have been carried.”

Q. “What are the types of funds held by Groups?”

A. “There are generally three types of funds

Unrestricted or general funds – these are funds that a charity has received from a donor and which are not held for any particular charitable purpose. They can be spent as deemed fit by the trustees.

Designated funds – these are unrestricted funds that the trustees have set aside for a particular purpose. Such funds can be undesignated or re-designated.

Restricted funds – restricted funds have been given to a charity for a particular purpose and can only be spent on that purpose.”
